## The Read Aloud

### **BEFORE READING**

Use these before reading the story to help students activate background knowledge and make predictions:

- I wonder what it means when a Big Storm is coming. What do you think happens during a big storm?
- Look at the animals on the cover of this book. How do you think the animals are feeling about the storm?

#### **DURING THE STORY**

Use these while reading the story to help students interpret the action and content.

- I wonder why Bruce does not like neighbors.
- Does anyone want to guess what "pestering" means?
- I wonder what it means that "the big storm was too much" for Nibbs the mouse.
- I wonder what a rescue mission is.
- What do you think it means that "one last quest arrived...A great big oak tree?"

This book is best for kids ages 3-5 years old.

Model curiosity and wonder with these power phrases...

# Ask these questions about any book...

Why do you think the author wrote this story? What's their message?

How did things change in the story?

What does this story make you wonder about?

## Help readers show their thinking by asking...

That's interesting! What made you think that? Or how do you know?

- What are some of the different ways that Bruce's neighbors help out after the storm?
- I notice everyone had to pitch in. What does that mean they are doing?
- I wonder what a rumpus room is. Does anyone want to guess?

### AFTER READING

Use these after reading the story to help students understand what they just read.

- I wonder why all the animals came to Bruce's house. Can anyone guess why?
- How did Bruce feel about his neighbors being in his house?
- What happened when the storm came?
- How do you think the mouse and the rabbit felt when they were swept away by the storm?
- Tell me more about what Bruce did when the mouse and the rabbit were in trouble?
- What or who made it possible to save the mouse, the rabbit, and even Bruce?
- What did the animals see when they went outside after the storm passed?
- How did Bruce's house get put back together? What happened to make this possible?
- What are some examples that show the animals being brave?

### BRINGING THE BOOK TO LIFE!

- ♥ How do you think it would feel to be in a big storm?
- Think of a time when you needed to stay inside to be safe. How did that make you feel?
- How do you think it makes someone feel when you help them?
- What are some of the ways you help other people?
- Why is it important to help others?
- What is an example of someone you know being brave, even if they felt frightened at the time?

### **COOPERATIVE LEARNING**

- With a partner:
  - o Come up with some ways you can help others in your family or school.
  - o Imagine you are stuck inside for a whole day. What are some of the things you can do to pass the time?
- Round Robin:
  - o What was your favorite part of this story? Why?

### **Small Group Activities**

### **DISCUSSION ACTIVITY**

- Bruce did not seem to like his neighbors. Why do you think that is?
- Even though Bruce is grumpy, his neighbors seem to like him a lot, even making him their Den Mother. Why do you think that is?
- How were the animals able to accomplish the rescue mission?
- How did the animals help Bruce?
- Can you think of something you do by yourself that would be easier or more fun if others were doing it with you?
- Think of things in your neighborhood or school that need cleaning up and ways you can help to do this.

### WRITING ACTIVITY

- I learned something interesting about the author of this book: He is an illustrator too. That means he wrote the book and drew all the pictures in the story. Imagine a story of your own and draw some parts of it.
- Draw a picture of you and your family (or you and your classmates) doing something to help someone.

• Draw a picture of what it feels like to be frightened, and a picture of what it feels like to be brave.

### **EXTENSION ACTIVITY**

- Think of some ways you can help comfort someone who might be scared.
- Think of someone who helps others and write a class note to thank them for being brave, kind, etc. (If needed, prompt children to think of first responders, doctors/nurses, teachers, school cafeteria or sanitation staff, etc.)
