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The State of Literacy in San Diego County Literacy Statistics You Should Know

- 46% of 3rd graders in the San Diego Unified School District do not meet the standard for language arts (reading/writing).
- 82% of **3rd graders** in Solana Beach Elementary School District **meet the language arts standard** compared to 32% from the South Bay Unified School District.
- Almost 70% of White **students**, countywide, in grades 3-8 and 11th grade, **meet the language arts standard** vs. Black students (40%) and Latinx students (44%).
- National City, Chula Vista, and Imperial Beach adult residents rank lowest in literacy skills among those residing in the 18 cities in the region. 33% of National City adult residents read English at a 0-4 grade level.
- Percentage of residents, age 5 and over, who speak a language other than English at home:

U.S.	21.6%
California	44.2%
Imperial County	76.5%
Los Angeles County	56.6%
San Diego County	37.6%
Los Angeles City	58.9%
San Diego City	40.5%
National City	69.2%
Solana Beach	16.7%

- The least literate **adult** residents in San Diego County **communities** are in San Ysidro, the Southeast community (City of San Diego), and Encanto.
- The most literate adult residents in our region's communities live in La Jolla Shores and Julian.
- The residents of the cities of Encinitas and Del Mar rank highest in reading prose among San Diego County residents of all ages.
- Over the past 28 years, ranking highest in adult literacy skills are residents of the cities of Poway, Carlsbad, Coronado, Encinitas, Del Mar, and Solana Beach.
- While Santee adult residents rank among the highest in adult literacy skills in the region, 44% of 3rd graders in the Santee School District do not meet the language arts standard.

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### **The UPS Store Book Giveaway**

On May 1st, a school bus filled with books traveled to three locations across San Diego County to distribute books to children in selected communities. The UPS Store's donation of 55,000 books to the San Diego Council on Literacy, in partnership with Toys for Tots, made these book stops possible.

Jenny Robinson, head of public relations and social media for The UPS Store, shared why access to books is important. "We know that one in four children grows up without a book in their home. And we know that books at home is a critical piece of learning how to read."

The bus stopped at St. James Lutheran Church in Imperial Beach, the Jacobs Center in Central San Diego, and Lexington Elementary School in El Cajon. Books were given to 350+ children and families. About 3,200 books were handed out on this unique book giveaway day.

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## Thank you to Words Alive: Another Amazing Book Giveaway!



### Literacy for All Radio Show Archives

We are sorry to announce that, after three years, the wsRadio *Literacy for All Radio Show*, sponsored by the San Diego Council on Literacy, is no more.

wsRadio has shut down operations. The SDCOL is exploring other radio show options.

The Literacy for All Radio Show featured literacy experts and advocates from the San Diego region and around the country, including Ruth Colvin (now 104 years old), founder of Literacy Volunteers of America; Nora Briggs, executive director of the Dollywood Foundation's "Imagination Library" program's North American operations; and Kevin Morgan, CEO of ProLiteracy.

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### **Imagination Library**

**Books Mailed To Homes of Children** 

The San Diego Council on Literacy is a proud coordinator of Dolly Parton's "Imagination Library" program. This program results in books being mailed, every month, to the homes of low-income children, ages 0-5, in selected local zip codes. For \$25.00 a year, a child receives 12 books.

Currently being served are children residing in these zip codes: 92102, 92105, 92113, 92114, 92116, 92054, and 92058.

The Dollywood Foundation invites communities to sponsor a local chapter of this program. Both the SDCOL and BASIC, an SDCOL affiliated literacy program in Borrego Springs, are the sole coordinators of Imagination Library programs in the region.

The program also operates in the United Kingdom, Ireland, and Australia. Last year, in its 25th year of operation, the Dollywood Foundation celebrated the donation of its 150 millionth book.

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### Little Free Library

Books in the 'Hood

We are grateful to the County of San Diego and Supervisor Nora Vargas for new funding being provided towards more Little Free Library stand-ups in the San Diego region. Funding in the amount of \$20,000 was recently approved to purchase 40 new Little Free Library sites.

Little libraries are mailbox like structures put up in communities to create neighborhood book exchanges where people can freely borrow or leave books for others to read. They can be found all around San Diego County.

"Residents can borrow books as they like and return them afterward in an honor-based system," said District One Supervisor, Nora Vargas.

With the Board's vote approval, the San Diego County Library will work with the San Diego Council on Literacy, nonprofits like the national Little Free Library, and volunteer groups to increase the number of little libraries and put books in them.

"The reality is there are vast disparities," Vargas said. "Many children don't have access to age-appropriate books at home, which causes them to fall behind. This initiative is going to address disparities seen in disadvantaged communities by promoting and encouraging reading from home and by creating more access to literature."

- We are not dwelling on this. We are looking back to see how far we have come.
   There's value in that.
- And while THIS was happening, yes, we had patience and faith.
- Many of us had it in our minds fourteen months ago that we might be in for a long ride.
- And we lived by this and communicated it to those around us, verbally and non-verbally.
- And that made a world of difference.
- And now we are coming back.
